### History of The CN Pensioners' Association of Manitoba

On October 17th, 1930, thirty-two retired employees accepted an invitation from Mr. W.R Devenish, General Superintendent of the Canadian National Railways, to attend a luncheon in the Fort Garry Hotel for the purpose of forming a group to promote, maintain, and foster social and fraternal relations; to keep alive the traditions of the Canadian National Railways, and to preserve the loyalty and brotherhood of its employees.

Enthusiasm was high and by December 1st they had chosen honorary officers, elected active officers, approved by-laws, had a meeting room in the Union Station and selected a name – The Canadian National Railways Veterans' Association, Division No. 1 Western Region.

The first President, H. L. Cameron, exemplified the enthusiasm and commitment to this new association – he was actively involved for 14 years as President, Secretary and Grand President of the Western Region Branches. Over the years, many others also gave of their time and talents: Chris Brady, Bert King, Frank Hill, Bill Buchanan, Jack Sanders and Charlie Smith, to name a few. It was recorded that "we have so many good men amongst us, it is hard to find a job for them all."

Although the first woman member, Mrs. Thelma Garvie, did not join until 1970, the "ladies" played an active role in supporting their husband's activities. Cribbage, dart teams, indoor quoits, carpet bowling, lawn bowling and sing-songs were very popular. Monthly whist drives provided much-needed revenue for almost 40 years, and the Five Pin Bowling League, which was formed in 1946, is still active. Picnics to Grand Beach, the annual Christmas Party, and tours of the local breweries were always popular and well attended. Monthly meetings featured movies of the Grey Cup and English Soccer Games, as well as members entertaining with music and story-telling. Shut-ins were never forgotten and fruit baskets were sent twice a year to those unable to attend meetings.

The success of the association was widely known throughout the West and other associations were soon formed in Vancouver, Edmonton and Saskatoon. Together, these associations were able to speak on behalf of their members and pressed for an increase in the pension for retired employees.

In 1995 the U.T.U. Seniors joined with the Association and the name was changed to the CN Pensioners Association of Manitoba.

When the Association was formed in 1930, people had very little money as a result of the Wall Street Crash and the Great Depression. In 1934, 25% of the members had no pension; there was no Unemployment Insurance and the Old Age Pension was only \$20 per month and not available until 70 years of age. Members were from all different areas of the CN workplace...offices, shops, yards and running trades and from many different ethnic and religious backgrounds. Religion and politics were never discussed at meetings and rather than emphasizing their differences, they chose to work together to support each other.

Although the Association has seen many changes throughout the years, that same bond of friendship and fellowship that helped establish the association can still be found today, more than 75 years later. For many years the Manitoba Association was not a member of the National Council. Since we joined the National Council, we have gained considerable knowledge of the concerns of other Associations across Canada and we now at least have local members on the CN Pension Committee. The Pensioners across Canada, of approximately 33,000 persons, is a major group to be recognized and consulted when Pension Plan changes are being considered. Members are kept informed of the health and welfare of fellow members and are also advised of any changes in pensions or benefits which may affect them. Programs and social events provide a warm environment to meet with old friends and make new friends. As of 2020, there are approximately 33,000 pensioners across Canada of which approximately 25,000 are contributing members of the CN Pensioners' Association. Of the 25,000 contributing members, approximately 3,600 are contributing members of the CN Pensioners' Association of Manitoba.



There is a **Step by Step Guide** to assist in this process on our website at <a href="https://www.cnpensioners.org">https://www.cnpensioners.org</a> under the Community/Volunteers tabs and if you have any difficulties, help is always available by emailing Lorenza at <a href="mailroadersinthecommunity@cn.ca">railroadersinthecommunity@cn.ca</a>


Once you are registered, you can begin to select your charities and log your volunteer hours. That same **Step by Step Guide** provides instructions and tips on how to manage all this and when all else fails, an email to railroadersinthecommunity@cn.ca is available for assistance.

Volunteer hours worked and logged by CN retirees, their spouses or surviving spouses are eligible to be entered into the system. For each hour of volunteer service recorded, CN will donate \$15 to that charitable organization, up to an annual maximum of \$2,250. You can record your hours as you go, and you will receive a confirmation email from Benevity that your submission has been accepted. Once verified, Benevity will electronically process the payment for the charitable organizations the following month. You have the ability to track your volunteer hours and the payments made to your charities under "My Profile" on their website.

There is also a **Bonus Payment of \$100** made by CN at the end of the year for each **Contributing Member, Spouse or Surviving Spouse** that volunteered under this program (one bonus per PIN). It will automatically be paid out to your selected charity, and if you volunteered for more than one charity during the year, CN will contact you in January to determine which of your charities should receive the \$100. So, if you are volunteering under this program, your annual dues of \$12 provide an additional \$100 to your charity.

### Giving from her heart for 42 years

When Audrey Hill joined the Daughters of the Nile organization in Winnipeg, MB, 42 years ago little did she know the impact the work would have in her life and on her community many years later.

The fraternal organization for women was formed in 1913 in Seattle Washington by the wives of Shriners. The Canadian chapter is dedicated to the growth of its permanent Convalescent Relief and Convalescent Endowment funds in support of the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Canada.

"The CN Railroaders in the Community program is a wonderful thing and the grants we have received for my volunteer work have contributed to both funds," says Audrey, whose late husband, Douglas Hill, worked as a painter in the Transcona Car Shop in Winnipeg before retiring in 1989. He was also a Masonic and a member of the Khartum Shrine.

Audrey is Chairperson of her Temple's Hospital Request Committee that reviews various needs at Shriners hospitals from bibs and quilts to specialized equipment such as wheelchairs. Over the years they have shipped over 10,000 articles, worth almost \$150,000, and contributed other items worth more than \$50,000. Along with the items, each carton includes a love note to the children.

"I have been touched by the many letters of gratitude from the hospitals over the years," adds Audrey.

"Knowing that some child's life has been made a little happier and a little easier makes me proud of our ladies and happy to think I've been a part of it."

In closing, 2020 was a challenging year, and some of those challenges will continue on into 2021 quite possibly for a good portion of the year. # Pension Report - Linda Schram

## Historic Background of the CN Pension Plans

**Defined Benefit Pension Plan** - A pension plan that defines the pension benefit to be provided based on factors, such as years of plan membership and average earnings, calculated in accordance with the terms of the plan.

**Defined Contribution Plan** - A pension plan that defines the amount of employer and employee contributions (if any) to the pension fund, determined on an individual account basis. The benefit the member will receive on retirement is determined at the date of retirement and is based on accrued contributions and investment income.

### CN **1935** Plan:

1935	The company established the CN 1935 Pension Plan which provided a basic pension of
1933	The company established the CN 1933 I clision I fail which provided a basic pension of
	\$25.00 per month.

January 1, 1952 The Pension Plan was amended to provide for a further alternative contributing form of the defined benefit type based on an employee's final average earnings. The defined benefit was designated as Part 2. The original part of the 1935 plan was designated Part 1.

October 31, 2015 The 1935 plan was merged into the CN Pension Plan.

#### CN 1959 Plan:

1959	January 1, 1959, part 2 of the 1935 plan became the CN 1959 Plan. This is a defined benefit plan. From this date, all employees were required to participate in the CN Plan as a condition of employment.
1952-1978	Members of the CN 1935 Plan were permitted to become members of the CN 1959 Pension Plan, subject to appropriate contributions.

January 1, 1998 The normal form of survivor benefit was increased from 50% to 55%.

Throughout the years, the CN 1959 Pension Plan was amended on several occasions to modify the benefits and conditions of participation.

The Pension Committee consists of equal representation from CN, unions and pensioners. The pensioners are elected by pensioners in each region for a term of 3 years. The committee meets 4 times per year to oversee changes and authorize pension requests. The CN Investment Division updates us on the financial status of the Pension Trust Fund.

2006	January 1, 2006 The CN Pension Plan was modified to account for the establishment of the DC Plan. Subject to certain exceptions, non-unionized active members of the CN Pension Plan were given the option to participate in the CN Pension Plan or in the DC Plan for service from January 1, 2006. Non-unionized employees hired on or after January 1, 2006
	participate in the DC Plan.

Anyone assuming permanent non-union position must be part of the DC Plan.

# Strengthening Canadians' Retirement Security Consultation

We all know that 2020 was a tumultuous year. For many federally regulated companies, like airlines and others, finances were strained. The Federal Government, last spring, provided temporary Pension Plan funding relief to corporations. As reported earlier, for CN and our Pension Plan Fund, the solvency status was affected marginally by the Covid-19 pandemic in the first quarter and then recovered by year end 2020. As we go into a second year of the pandemic and more uncertainty, the Federal Government has asked for input from stakeholders on proposed changes to longer term pension financing, governance, and other areas.

Your CNPA Association had internal discussions on areas of concern to pensioners and other improvement ideas. We will submit our recommendations and understand CN may as well. The Government will consolidate all the various submissions and recommendations and also review expressed concerns and then make policy change proposals later this Spring which will be subject to further review.

We as an association have your best interests in mind and we will press the government to seriously consider our input. Once we have a better idea what options and direction the Government will take, we will provide additional detail.

Some of the areas the government is reviewing are:

- Pension plan governance
- Solvency reserve accounts
- Variable payment life annuities
- Ministerial guidelines on special funding relief



# Tick Season is Here -Be Tick Smart!

What is Lyme Disease? Lyme Disease and other tick-borne illnesses are infections by disease causing pathogens such as viruses, parasites, and bacteria that are contracted through the bite of an infected black legged tick (also known as a deer tick). Lyme can be transmitted by other ticks as well, although this is less common. In some Provinces other tick-borne illnesses are also reportable such as in Manitoba:



- ♦ Borrelliosis (Lyme) first reportable 2009
- ♦ Anaplasmosis *first reportable 2015*

### Emerging & Other Tick-borne Infections

- ♦ Borrellia Miyamotoi this Borrelia strain typically does not produce an EM rash and can be transmitted by larval black-legged ticks which are typically active from late spring through to late summer, peaking in August.
- Deer Tick Virus (Powassan Virus). Although transmission time is not 100% clear for any tick-borne infection, this virus can be transmitted in a little as 15 minutes after attachment.
- ♦ Other strains of Borrelia

### Prevention:

- Walk in the centre of a trail; avoid leaf litter and long grass
- Wear light colored clothing, long pants and tuck them in your socks
- Wear bug repellant containing at least 20% deet
- Shower or bathe after being outdoors
- Do a proper full body tick check (eg: hair, scalp, ears, armpits, waist, groin, bellybutton, behind the knee)
- Don't forget to check your clothes and your pets for ticks

### How to Remove a Tick:

- Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible.
- Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick; this can cause the mouth-parts to break off and remain in the skin. If this happens, remove the mouth-parts with tweezers.
- After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol, an iodine scrub, or soap and water.
- Save the tick in a sealed tight container with a damp cotton ball so it can be identified and available for future testing.
- Never crush a tick with your fingers. Disinfect your tweezers!!
- With tick removal the head may get stuck, remove as you would with a splinter or sliver. Remove with a sterilized needle or tweezers. Wet the bite spot first. If the head of the tick remains inside, the salivary glands may still be there so risk of contamination. If you can't get it out, go to your doctor or a Walk-in Clinic.
- Do not use other methods as they might irritate the tick thus increasing the chances that the tick might produce extra saliva and then vomits its stomach into you.

# CN 2747 Enclosure Project and Capital Campaign



On 19 April 2021, the Transcona Museum (Winnipeg, Man.) launched a \$493,000 capital campaign project for the construction of a protective structure over historic locomotive CN 2747.

CN 2747 is an artifact of significant historical importance not only to the community of Transcona but to Canada. It was the first steam locomotive constructed at the Transcona Shops and the first built in Western Canada in April 1926. After 34 years of service, CN 2747 was retired and placed on permanent outdoor display in 1960. Since taking ownership in 2015, the Transcona Museum has undertaken necessary preservation work to ensure the stability and longevity of the locomotive. This work has totaled over \$63,000 to date.

We are excited to be moving forward on the next major step of the project – the construction of a protective enclosure over the engine. This structure will help protect the engine from the elements, increase security around it, and provide more opportunities for the public to see, interact, and appreciate the historical artifact. It is our goal to provide more consistent access and interpretation of the engine, including programming and tours. The chosen conceptual design (see image) best addresses the preservation and display goals of the project.

We are now actively soliciting donations and sponsorships to help us make this project a reality. Your support means that you understand just how valuable preserving CN 2747 is to the community of Transcona, Winnipeg, and Canada. This project would be difficult to achieve without your support.
