President's View—Ron Davis

Rail Safety Week—April 27th to May 3rd, 2015

From April 27th to May 3rd, *CN has again this year joined forces with Operation Lifesaver* to promote public rail safety to communities throughout our network during *Rail Safety Week*. We encourage everyone to think safety not just during the official "Rail Safety Week", but every week.

Here are 10 tips that could save your life.

- 1. Never walk or play on train tracks. It's dangerous and illegal. Also never play or stay near a stopped train.
- 2. Be prepared to stop at crossings.
- 3. Cross train tracks at designated highway/railroad crossings.
- 4. Look for the crossbuck sign, lights or gates at crossings.
- 5. Listen for warning bells and whistles.
- 6. Obey the signals.
- 7. Wait for the train to pass through the crossing, then wait again, to be sure that a second train is not approaching on another track in the same or opposite direction.
- 8. Obey the directions of a police officer or member of a train crew directing traffic at a crossing.
- 9. Cross the tracks in low gear; do not change gears while crossing.
- 10. Stalled vehicle? Get out guickly and move away from the vehicle and tracks.

Reporting Hazards:

Report hazardous conditions at highway-railroad crossings or on railroad rights-of-way. Railroad emergency numbers are generally posted prominently at crossings, on either crossing posts, behind a crossing sign or on a signal box. You may want to keep the toll free number for CN Police handy. Should you witness any unsafe situation near the railroad, please call 1-800-465-9239. If you are unable to locate this number immediately, call 911 or the local emergency number. Take the Safety Pledge at www.mysafetypledge.com, share these safety tips with family and friends, and act as a role model for all. We encourage everyone to support CN's community-education program, All Aboard for Safety. Never walk or play on train tracks. It's dangerous and illegal. Also never play or stay near a stopped train.

Meet Your Fellow Pensioner: "There is What in Your Blood"

As a CNR pensioner I have been subjected to many medical tests, both for my job and by my own doctor. Never have they ever found railroading in my blood, but it is there. I am a third generation railroader like many others. My grandfather was a locomotive engineer for the Nederlandse Spoorwegen [Netherlands Railway]. In 1956 we, my mom, dad, my sister and I, immigrated to Canada. My dad had worked for Phillips in The Netherlands as an electrician, but Canada did not recognize his translated papers. He eventually found work as an electrician's helper, and after serving four years in the trade he was allowed to write the journeyman's exam. After working in construction, mostly away from home, in Manitoba's north, he found work at the CNR when they opened Symington Yard in 1962. Little did I know that after a grade 12 electrical course and my time in the north in construction I would follow in his footsteps.

I was hired by CNR as an electrician in 1971 and my dad took great pleasure in the fact that everyone at Symington diesel shop thought we were brothers. He looked younger or I looked older.

Just a year before I had resumed a childhood hobby of model railroading, and now I could climb all over the real thing and take measurements and pictures for modelling. In Holland I had a 1/48 scale live steam engine and cars. My first train was a 1/120 scale windup train for my 8th birthday. My new interest in trains came when I saw the fairly new "N" 1/160 scale at a friend's house. It became my choice scale because of my space restriction in my new home. My interests in trains didn't just lie in modelling, but also in photography and memorabilia. I found a Toronto supplier of tiles with pictures of both CN and CP locomotives on them. When I proudly showed these off at work my nickname of "chooch" was coined. Others were also interested in these tiles, so I took orders and brought them in by CN express. Eventually my sales were such that I gave it over to Midwestern Rail Museum as a fund raiser. This organization had just started up in 1974 and they were allowed to sell some souvenirs on board the then fairly new Prairie Dog Central. We sold postcards and more tiles aboard the Prairie Dog Central. I became vice president of restoration and was involved in the restoration of the Miami Manitoba railway station and its associated structures. They included the station, water tower, which had just received paint, as it was still used by local farmers, and his and her outhouses.

In 1977, I transferred to the Work Equipment Shop in Transcona. In the spring of 1978, being junior on the seniority list, I started working out on the road with the steel gang. When I was working at Symington in 1971, I had worked the Search machine to test locomotives. This gave me the ability to know our engines inside and out, as far as electrical troubles were concerned. Trouble shooting is what I did so when in the spring of 1978 I was at Kenville Manitoba, just west of Swan River, with the steel gang repairing their machines, I had a two watt radio and I could hear the engineer at Swan River in trouble with his 4200 series GP9s. He said that with one engine dead he could not make it to Dauphin. I told my gang supervisor that I might be able to help him so he picked up his microphone for his 30 watt radio and told the operator at Swan River that I could fix his engine.

My gang supervisor must have been impressed with my work from that job, because the next day he sent me to Saskatchewan on the same subdivision further west to repair an air compressor circuit on a diesel electric crane. The air circuit was not electrical and disassembly of the pressure regulator and a good wash to get rid of rust fixed the problem. My ability as a trouble shooter started to be known. Because of this work took me from Kingston Ontario to Smithers and Kitimat in northern British Columbia and down to the DWP in Virginia Minnesota.

It has been an exciting career and since I retired in 2001, I have kept up my rule card and have been volunteering as conductor on the Prairie Dog Central from 1999 until 2007. This year I am starting all over again with rules and medical to resume my role as passenger train conductor on the Prairie Dog Central.

In my time between 2007 and now I have also filled the position of President and board member of The Dutch Canadian Society of Manitoba. My position on the board gave me the opportunity to repair and operate a 1911 Dutch street organ. Most of the organ is made of wood and leather. It is air operated and hand driven with an optional motor attached. Last winter I replaced the bellows, crankshaft bearing and the leathers on 14 valves. This year a couple of oak block bearings needed to be replaced and the flywheel needed extra weight and the handle to reposition. Each winter the organ needs some repair and parts have to be handmade.

Like so many other retirees I wonder where did we ever find time to work? My wife just asked what I was doing today and I said I'm doing nothing. She said you did that yesterday, yes but I wasn't finished. Keeping active keeps me young, feeling young keeps me healthy. I wish the best of health to all those who have worked hard to reach retirement, enjoy and think about the good old days. I am glad they happened when I could handle them.

RSS Feed



You may have noticed this little image/icon in black and white near the top right hand corner of our website (next to the email and facebook icon). You will also find it our on Blog page near the top right hand corner (in black and white) as well as part way down the right hand side in color (yellow).

This little icon is what you would click on to create an RSS Feed for our website and / or Blog page. What is an RSS Feed? Basically it stands for "Rich Site Summary" or "Really Simple Syndication". An RSS Feed enables publishers to syndicate data automatically. It also benefits users who want to receive timely updates from favourite websites or to aggregate data from many sites.

By subscribing to a website RSS Feed, it removes the need for the user to manually check the website for new content. Instead, their browser constantly monitors the site and informs the user of any updates. The browser can also be commanded to automatically download the new data for the user.

So how does one subscribe to an RSS Feed? Users can subscribe to a feed by clicking on the browser's feed icon. Try it out. Go to our website, www.cnpensioners.ca and click on this icon. It will then take you to a new screen where you just click on "Subscribe Now". The next screen will be a little box that will show you the name of the website you are subscribing to. Hit "Subscribe" again and it should be set up for you.

To check for updates, go to your browser home screen (eg. msn.ca). Near the top left hand corner just below the browser url address line, you will see the little yellow icon. Click on that and any updates to our website that would have been posted since you signed up for the RSS Feed, will appear. Select the item you wish to read and click on it.

Hello to all my fellow retirees. Those of you, whose path I have crossed or walked alongside over the 36 years I worked at CN, might be aware that I am involved with a Railway Conductor pre-employment training program, administered by Red River College. The preponderance of our students are hired by CN or CP and the transition for student to employee is uneventful as they have been trained in all the necessary rules, GOI's and practical training. We lease a locomotive and trackage in Transcona from CN, where each day we demonstrate on live equipment, the essential activities expected of a railway conductor. We train about 100 conductors.

In addition to Conductors, we also train Corporately for Industrial work, such as elevators that move cars, engineering companies that contract to CN or CP and a myriad of other external clients. As a matter of fact we are in discussion and negotiation with the Country of Oman, Saudi Arabia to train 40 of their employees here in Winnipeg. Each venue of training is exciting and allows myself and 8 instructors from both CN and CP background to stay in touch with Railroading. The single biggest surprise to me personally, is how we touch people's lives. We are constantly contacted by former students, telling us they got married, had a baby, were promoted to engineer, should they go into management, or ask advice when they are under investigation, and on and on. The finger-prints of my grandfather, my father and myself, will forever be imbedded with those we have touched through this school.

Having said all that, I invite those of you that think they have the time and enthusiasm to share your experience and get paid for it, to consider working with us as instructors. We are short of experienced instructors with all the new business we enjoy. Our preference is the candidate be within two years since they last worked. Obviously they must have been qualified in the CROR and we will re-qualify them. It is preferred that the candidates had some management background, or OJT's. Some former CN employees instructing here are Bill Hunter (Chief RTC), Earl Code (Asst. Chief RTC), Bill Motluk (Superintendent), Bryan Harmer (Engineer OJT),
